7 (b) COMMITTEE ON HEALTH, EDUCATION, LABOR
8 AND PENSIONS.—The Committee on Health, Education,
9 Labor and Pensions of the Senate shall report changes
10 in laws within its jurisdiction to reduce the deficit by
11 \$1,000,000,000 for the period of fiscal years 2016
12 through 2025.

13 (c) SUBMISSIONS.—In the Senate, not later than July
14 31, 2015, the Senate Committees named in subsections
15 (a) and (b) shall submit their recommendations to the
16 Committee on the Budget of the Senate. Upon receiving
17 all such recommendations, the Committee on the Budget
18 of the Senate shall report to the Senate a reconciliation
19 bill carrying out all such recommendations without any
20 substantive revision.

24 associated events, including sea-level rise, flooding, and in-
25 creased storm surge, by the amounts provided in such leg-

1 islation for those purposes, provided that such legislation

16 **Subtitle A—Budget Enforcement**

18 **POINTS OF ORDER IN THE SENATE.**

19 (a) EXTENSION OF CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET ACT
20 OF 1974 POINTS OF ORDER.—

21 (1) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding any provi-
22 sion of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2
23 U.S.C. 621 et seq.), subsections (c)(2) and (d)(3) of
24 section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of
25 1974 (2 U.S.C. 621 note) shall remain in effect for

1 purposes of Senate enforcement through September
2 30, 2025.

3 (2) REPEAL.—In the Senate, section 205 of S.
4 Con. Res. 21 (110th Congress), the concurrent reso-
5 lution on the budget for fiscal year 2008, shall no
6 longer apply.

7 (b) OTHER POINTS OF ORDER.—

8 (1) PAY-AS-YOU-GO.—Section 201(d) of S.
9 Con. Res. 21 (110th Congress), the concurrent reso-
10 lution on the budget for fiscal year 2008, is re-
11 pealed.

12 (2) INCREASING SHORT-TERM DEFICIT.—Sec-
13 tion 404(e) of S. Con. Res. 13 (111th Congress), the
14 concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal year
15 2010, is repealed.

16 **SEC. 402. SENATE POINT OF ORDER AGAINST LEGISLATION**
17 **INCREASING LONG-TERM DEFICITS.**

18 (a) CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE ANALYSIS OF
19 PROPOSALS.—The Director of the Congressional Budget
20 Office shall, to the extent practicable, prepare for each bill
21 and joint resolution reported from committee (except
22 measures within the jurisdiction of the Committee on Ap-
23 propriations), and amendments thereto, amendments be-
24 tween the Houses in relation thereto, and conference re-
25 ports thereon, an estimate of whether the measure would

1 cause, relative to current law, a net increase in on-budget
2 deficits in excess of \$5,000,000,000 in any of the 4 con-
3 secutive 10-year periods beginning with the first fiscal
4 year that is 10 years after the budget year provided for
5 in the most recently adopted concurrent resolution on the
6 budget.

7 (b) POINT OF ORDER.—It shall not be in order in
8 the Senate to consider any bill, joint resolution, amend-
9 ment, motion, amendment between the Houses, or con-
10 ference report that would cause a net increase in on-budg-
11 et deficits in excess of \$5,000,000,000 in any of the 4
12 consecutive 10-year periods described in subsection (a).

13 (c) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL IN THE
14 SENATE.—

16 suspended only by the affirmative vote of three-fifths
17 of the Members, duly chosen and sworn.

18 (2) APPEAL.—An affirmative vote of three-
19 fifths of the Members, duly chosen and sworn, shall
20 be required to sustain an appeal of the ruling of the
21 Chair on a point of order raised under subsection
22 (b).

23 (d) LIMITATION.—The provisions of this section shall
24 not apply to any bills, joint resolutions, amendments, mo-
25 tions, amendment between the Houses, or conference re-

1 ports for which the chairman of the Committee on the
2 Budget of the Senate has made adjustments to the alloca-
3 tions, levels, or limits contained in this resolution pursuant
4 to section 303(1).

5 (e) DETERMINATIONS OF BUDGET LEVELS.—For
6 purposes of this section, the levels of net deficit increases
7 shall be determined on the basis of estimates provided by
8 the Committee on the Budget of the Senate.

9 (f) REPEAL.—In the Senate, section 311 of S. Con.
10 Res. 70 (110th Congress), the concurrent resolution on
11 the budget for fiscal year 2009, shall no longer apply.

12 **SEC. 403. POINT OF ORDER AGAINST ADVANCE APPROPRIA-**
13 **TIONS.**

14 (a) IN GENERAL.—

15 (1) POINT OF ORDER.—Except as provided in
16 subsection (b), it shall not be in order in the Senate
17 to consider any bill, joint resolution, motion, amend-
18 ment, amendment between the Houses, or con-
19 ference report that would provide an advance appro-
20 priation for a discretionary account.

21 (2) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term
22 “advance appropriation” means any new budget au-
23 thority provided in a bill or joint resolution making
24 appropriations for fiscal year 2016 that first be-
25 comes available for any fiscal year after 2016, or

1 any new budget authority provided in a bill or joint
2 resolution making general appropriations or con-
3 tinuing appropriations for fiscal year 2017, that first
4 becomes available for any fiscal year after 2017.

5 (b) EXCEPTIONS.—Advance appropriations may be
6 provided—

7 (1) for fiscal years 2017 and 2018 for pro-
8 grams, projects, activities, or accounts identified in
9 the joint explanatory statement of managers accom-
10 panying this resolution under the heading “Accounts
11 Identified for Advance Appropriations” in an aggre-
12 gate amount not to exceed \$28,852,000,000 in new
13 budget authority in each year;

14 (2) for the Corporation for Public Broad-
15 casting; and

16 (3) for the Department of Veterans Affairs for
17 the Medical Services, Medical Support and Compli-
18 ance, and Medical Facilities accounts of the Vet-
19 erans Health Administration.

20 (c) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—

21 (1) WAIVER.—In the Senate, subsection (a)
22 may be waived or suspended only by an affirmative
23 vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly chosen and
24 sworn.

1 (2) APPEAL.—An affirmative vote of three-
2 fifths of the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and
3 sworn, shall be required to sustain an appeal of the
4 ruling of the Chair on a point of order raised under
5 subsection (a).

6 (d) FORM OF POINT OF ORDER.—A point of order
7 under subsection (a) may be raised by a Senator as pro-
8 vided in section 313(e) of the Congressional Budget Act
9 of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 644(e)).

10 (e) CONFERENCE REPORTS.—When the Senate is
11 considering a conference report on, or an amendment be-
12 tween the Houses in relation to, a bill or joint resolution,
13 upon a point of order being made by any Senator pursuant
14 to this section, and such point of order being sustained,
15 such material contained in such conference report or
16 House amendment shall be stricken, and the Senate shall
17 proceed to consider the question of whether the Senate
18 shall recede from its amendment and concur with a fur-
19 ther amendment, or concur in the House amendment with
20 a further amendment, as the case may be, which further
21 amendment shall consist of only that portion of the con-
22 ference report or House amendment, as the case may be,
23 not so stricken. Any such motion in the Senate shall be
24 debatable. In any case in which such point of order is sus-
25 tained against a conference report (or Senate amendment

1 derived from such conference report by operation of this
2 subsection), no further amendment shall be in order.

3 **SEC. 404. SUPERMAJORITY ENFORCEMENT OF UNFUNDED**
4 **MANDATES.**

5 Paragraphs (1) and (2) of section 425(a) of the Con-
6 gressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 658d(a)) shall
7 be subject to the waiver and appeal requirements of sub-
8 sections (c)(2) and (d)(3), respectively, of section 904 of
9 the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 621
10 note).

11 **SEC. 405. REPEAL OF SENATE POINT OF ORDER AGAINST**
12 **CERTAIN RECONCILIATION LEGISLATION.**

13 Section 202 of S. Con. Res. 21 (110th Congress), the
14 concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2008,
15 shall no longer apply in the Senate.

16 **SEC. 406. POINT OF ORDER AGAINST CHANGES IN MANDA-**
17 **TORY PROGRAMS.**

18 (a) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term
19 “CHIMP” means a provision that—

20 (1) would have been estimated as affecting di-
21 rect spending or receipts under section 252 of the
22 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control
23 Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 902) (as in effect prior to
24 September 30, 2002) if the provision was included

1 in legislation other than an appropriations bill or
2 joint resolution; and

3 (2) does not result in a net decrease in outlays
4 over the period of the total of the current year, the
5 budget year, and all fiscal years covered under the
6 most recently adopted concurrent resolution on the
7 budget.

8 (b) POINT OF ORDER.—

9 (1) IN GENERAL.—In the Senate, it shall not be
10 in order to consider an appropriations bill or joint
11 resolution, or an amendment to, conference report
12 on, or amendment between the Houses in relation to
13 such a bill or joint resolution, that contains a
14 CHIMP that, if enacted, would cause the total budg-
15 et authority of all such CHIMPs enacted in relation
16 to a fiscal year to be more than the amount specified
17 in paragraph (2).

18 (2) AMOUNT.—The amount specified in this
19 paragraph is—

20 (A) for fiscal year 2016, \$19,000,000,000;

21 (B) for fiscal year 2017, \$16,000,000,000;

22 (C) for fiscal year 2018, \$12,000,000,000;

23 (D) for fiscal year 2019, \$8,000,000,000;

24 (E) for fiscal year 2020, \$4,000,000,000;

25 and

1 (F) for fiscal year 2021, and each fiscal
2 year thereafter, \$0.

3 (c) DETERMINATION.—The determination of whether
4 a provision is subject to a point of order under subsection
5 (b) shall be made by the Chairman of the Committee on
6 the Budget of the Senate.

7 (d) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—Sub-
8 section (b) may be waived or suspended in the Senate only
9 by an affirmative vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly
10 chosen and sworn. An affirmative vote of three-fifths of
11 the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and sworn, shall
12 be required to sustain an appeal of the ruling of the Chair
13 on a point of order raised under subsection (b).

14 (e) REPEAL.—In the Senate, section 314 of S. Con.
15 Res. 70 (110th Congress), the concurrent resolution on
16 the budget for fiscal year 2009, shall no longer apply.

17 **SEC. 407. PROHIBITION ON AGREEING TO LEGISLATION**
18 **WITHOUT A SCORE.**

19 (a) IN GENERAL.—In the Senate, it shall not be in
20 order to vote on passage of matter that requires an esti-
21 mate described in section 402 of the Congressional Budget
22 Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 653), unless such estimate was
23 made publicly available on the website of the Congres-
24 sional Budget Office not later than 28 hours before the
25 time the vote commences.

1 (b) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—

2 (1) WAIVER.—In the Senate, subsection (a)
3 may be waived or suspended only by an affirmative
4 vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly chosen and
5 sworn.

6 (2) APPEAL.—An affirmative vote of three-
7 fifths of the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and
8 sworn, shall be required to sustain an appeal of the
9 ruling of the Chair on a point of order raised under
10 subsection (a).

11 **SEC. 408. PROTECTING THE SAVINGS IN REPORTED REC-**
12 **ONCILIATION BILLS.**

13 In the Senate, section 310(d)(1) of the Congressional
14 Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 641(d)(1)) shall apply and
15 may be waived in accordance with the procedures applica-
16 ble to a point of order raised under section 310(d)(2) of
17 such Act.

18 **SEC. 409. POINT OF ORDER AGAINST EXCEEDING FUNDS**
19 **DESIGNATED FOR OVERSEAS CONTINGENCY**
20 **OPERATIONS.**

21 (a) POINT OF ORDER.—It shall not be in order in
22 the Senate to consider a provision in any bill, joint resolu-
23 tion, amendment, motion, amendment between the
24 Houses, or conference report that designates for overseas
25 contingency operations, in accordance with section

1 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
2 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)(2)(A)),
3 funds that would cause the total amount of funds des-
4 ignated for overseas contingency operations—

5 (1) for fiscal year 2016, to be more than
6 \$57,997,000,000; or

7 (2) for fiscal year 2017, to be more than
8 \$59,500,000,000.

9 (b) DETERMINATION.—The determination of whether
10 a provision is subject to a point of order under this section
11 shall be made by the Chairman of the Committee on the
12 Budget of the Senate.

13 (c) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—This
14 section may be waived or suspended in the Senate only
15 by an affirmative vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly
16 chosen and sworn. An affirmative vote of three-fifths of
17 the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and sworn, shall
18 be required to sustain an appeal of the ruling of the Chair
19 on a point of order raised under this section.

20 (d) FORM OF POINT OF ORDER.—A point of order
21 under this section may be raised by a Senator as provided
22 in section 313(e) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974
23 (2 U.S.C. 644(e)).

24 (e) CONFERENCE REPORTS.—When the Senate is
25 considering a conference report on, or an amendment be-

1 tween the Houses in relation to, a bill or joint resolution,
2 upon a point of order being made by any Senator under
3 this section, and such point of order being sustained, such
4 material contained in such conference report or amend-
5 ment shall be stricken, and the Senate shall proceed to
6 consider the question of whether the Senate shall recede
7 from its amendment and concur with a further amend-
8 ment, or concur in the House amendment with a further
9 amendment, as the case may be, which further amendment
10 shall consist of only that portion of the conference report
11 or House amendment, as the case may be, not so stricken.
12 Any such motion shall be debatable. In any case in which
13 such point of order is sustained against a conference re-
14 port (or Senate amendment derived from such conference
15 report by operation of this subsection), no further amend-
16 ment shall be in order.

17 **SEC. 410. SENATE POINT OF ORDER AGAINST PROVISIONS**
18 **OF APPROPRIATIONS LEGISLATION THAT**
19 **CONSTITUTE CHANGES IN MANDATORY PRO-**
20 **GRAMS AFFECTING THE CRIME VICTIMS**
21 **FUND.**

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—In the Senate, it shall not be in
23 order to consider any appropriations legislation, including
24 any amendment thereto, motion in relation thereto, or
25 conference report thereon, that includes any provision or

1 provisions affecting the Crime Victims Fund, as defined
2 by section 1402 of the Victims of Crime Act of 1984 (42
3 U.S.C. 10601), which constitutes a change in a mandatory
4 program that would have been estimated as affecting di-
5 rect spending or receipts under section 252 of the Bal-
6 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985
7 (as in effect prior to September 30, 2002) were they in-
8 cluded in legislation other than appropriations legislation.
9 A point of order pursuant to this section shall be raised
10 against such provision or provisions as described in sub-
11 sections (d) and (e).

12 (b) DETERMINATION.—The determination of whether
13 a provision is subject to a point of order pursuant to this
14 section shall be made by the Committee on the Budget
15 of the Senate.

16 (c) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—This
17 section may be waived or suspended in the Senate only
18 by an affirmative vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly
19 chosen and sworn. An affirmative vote of three-fifths of
20 the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and sworn, shall
21 be required to sustain an appeal of the ruling of the Chair
22 on a point of order raised under this section.

23 (d) GENERAL POINT OF ORDER.—It shall be in order
24 for a Senator to raise a single point of order that several
25 provisions of a bill, resolution, amendment, motion, or con-

1 ference report violate this section. The Presiding Officer
2 may sustain the point of order as to some or all of the
3 provisions against which the Senator raised the point of
4 order. If the Presiding Officer so sustains the point of
5 order as to some of the provisions (including provisions
6 of an amendment, motion, or conference report) against
7 which the Senator raised the point of order, then only
8 those provisions (including provision of an amendment,
9 motion, or conference report) against which the Presiding
10 Officer sustains the point of order shall be deemed strick-
11 en pursuant to this section. Before the Presiding Officer
12 rules on such a point of order, any Senator may move to
13 waive such a point of order as it applies to some or all
14 of the provisions against which the point of order was
15 raised. Such a motion to waive is amendable in accordance
16 with rules and precedents of the Senate. After the Pre-
17 siding Officer rules on such a point of order, any Senator
18 may appeal the ruling of the Presiding Officer on such
19 a point of order as it applies to some or all of the provi-
20 sions on which the Presiding Officer ruled.

21 (e) FORM OF THE POINT OF ORDER.—When the
22 Senate is considering a conference report on, or an amend-
23 ment between the Houses in relation to, a bill or joint res-
24 olution, upon a point of order being made by any Senator
25 pursuant to this section, and such point of order being

1 sustained, such material contained in such conference re-
2 port or amendment shall be stricken, and the Senate shall
3 proceed to consider the question of whether the Senate
4 shall recede from its amendment and concur with a fur-
5 ther amendment, or concur in the House amendment with
6 a further amendment, as the case may be, which further
7 amendment shall consist of only that portion of the con-
8 ference report or House amendment, as the case may be,
9 not so stricken. Any such motion shall be debatable. In
10 any case in which such point of order is sustained against
11 a conference report (or Senate amendment derived from
12 such conference report by operation of this subsection),
13 no further amendment shall be in order.

14 **SEC. 411. ACCURACY IN BUDGET ENFORCEMENT.**

15 (a) TIMING SHIFTS.—

16 (1) DEFINITION.—In this subsection, the term
17 “timing shift” means—

18 (A) a delay of the date on which outlays
19 flowing from direct spending would otherwise
20 occur from 1 fiscal year to the next fiscal year;
21 or

22 (B) an acceleration of the date on which
23 revenues would otherwise occur from 1 fiscal
24 year to the previous fiscal year.

1 (2) SCORING.—In the Senate, the Chairman of
2 the Committee on the Budget shall not count timing
3 shifts in estimating the budgetary effects of a bill,
4 joint resolution, motion, amendment, amendment be-
5 tween the Houses, or conference report for purposes
6 of enforcing—

7 (A) the Congressional Budget Act of 1974
8 (2 U.S.C. 621 et seq.);

9 (B) any allocation, aggregate, or level
10 under a concurrent resolution on the budget; or

11 (C) any written statement submitted for
12 printing in the Congressional Record by the
13 Chairman of the Committee on the Budget of
14 the Senate that establishes allocations, aggre-
15 gates, and levels for purposes of enforcing the
16 Congressional Budget Act of 1974.

17 (b) PROHIBITION OF RESCISSIONS THAT DON'T
18 SAVE MONEY.—In the Senate, the Chairman of the Com-
19 mittee on the Budget shall not count any rescission of
20 budget authority or contract authority that does not have
21 an effect on outlays in estimating the changes in budget
22 authority, outlays, or revenues of a bill, joint resolution,
23 motion, amendment, amendment between the Houses, or
24 conference report for purposes of enforcing—

1 (1) the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2
2 U.S.C. 621 et seq.);

3 (2) any allocation, aggregate, or level under a
4 concurrent resolution on the budget; or

5 (3) any written statement submitted for print-
6 ing in the Congressional Record by the Chairman of
7 the Committee on the Budget of the Senate that es-
8 tablishes allocations, aggregates, and levels for pur-
9 poses of enforcing the Congressional Budget Act of
10 1974.

11 **SEC. 412. FAIR VALUE ESTIMATES.**

12 Any estimate prepared by the Director of the Con-
13 gressional Budget Office for a bill, joint, resolution, mo-
14 tion, amendment, amendment between the Houses, or con-
15 ference report under the terms of title V of the Congres-
16 sional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 661 et seq.), shall
17 include, when practicable, an additional estimate of the
18 cost, measured on a fair value basis, of changes that would
19 affect the amount or terms of new Federal loans or loan
20 guarantees or of modifications to existing Federal loans
21 or loan guarantees arising from the bill, joint resolution,
22 motion, amendment, amendment between the Houses, or
23 conference report.

24 **SEC. 413. HONEST ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES.**

25 (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

1 (1) BUDGET.—The term “budget” means

2 (A) a concurrent resolution on the budget;

3 or

4 (B) a written statement submitted for
5 printing in the Congressional Record by the
6 Chairman of the Committee on the Budget of
7 the Senate that establishes allocations, aggreg-
8 gates, and levels for purposes of enforcing the
9 Congressional Budget Act of 1974.

10 (2) BUDGETARY EFFECTS.—The term “budget-
11 etary effects” means changes in budget authority,
12 outlays, or revenues.

13 (3) MAJOR LEGISLATION.—

14 (A) DEFINITION.—The term “major legis-
15 lation” means any bill, resolution, conference
16 report, or treaty—

17 (i) for which an estimate is prepared
18 under section 402 of the Congressional
19 Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 653) that
20 indicates that not less than 1 of the
21 amounts described in subparagraph (B),
22 before incorporating macroeconomic ef-
23 fects, is greater than \$15,000,000,000 in
24 any fiscal year of the estimate; or

1 (ii) designated as major legislation by
2 the Chairman of the Committee on the
3 Budget of the Senate or the Chairman of
4 the Committee on the Budget of the House
5 of Representatives.

6 (B) AMOUNTS.—The amounts described in
7 this subparagraph are—

8 (i) the sum of the individual positive
9 changes in budgetary effects, not including
10 timing shifts, resulting from such measure;
11 and

12 (ii) the sum of the absolute value of
13 the individual negative budgetary effects,
14 not including timing shifts, resulting from
15 such measure.

16 (4) TIMING SHIFTS.—The term “timing shifts”
17 means—

18 (A) a delay of the date on which outlays
19 flowing from direct spending would otherwise
20 occur from one fiscal year to the next fiscal
21 year; or

22 (B) an acceleration of the date on which
23 revenues would otherwise occur from one fiscal
24 year to the next fiscal year.

1 (b) REQUIREMENT FOR CBO ESTIMATES.—An esti-
2 mate provided by the Congressional Budget Office under
3 section 402 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2
4 U.S.C. 653) for any major legislation shall provide, in ad-
5 dition to the estimate of budgetary effects without macro-
6 economic effects, an estimate of the budgetary effects
7 from changes in economic output, employment, interest
8 rates, capital stock, and other macroeconomic variables re-
9 sulting from the major legislation. The total budgetary ef-
10 fects shall delineate between revenue and outlay effects.

11 (c) REQUIREMENT FOR JCT ESTIMATES.—

12 (1) IN GENERAL.—An estimate provided by the
13 Joint Committee on Taxation to the Director of the
14 Congressional Budget Office under section 201(f) of
15 the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C.
16 601(f)) for any major legislation shall provide an es-
17 timate of the distributional effects across income
18 categories resulting from major legislation.

19 (2) DELINEATION.—The total budgetary effects
20 shall delineate between revenue and outlay effects.

21 (d) CONTENTS OF ESTIMATES.—An estimate re-
22 quired to be provided under subsection (b) or (c) shall in-
23 clude—

24 (1) a qualitative assessment of the budgetary
25 effects (including macroeconomic variables described

1 in subsections (b) and (c)) of the major legislation
2 in the 20-fiscal year period beginning after the last
3 fiscal year of the most recently adopted budget that
4 sets forth appropriate levels required under section
5 301 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2
6 U.S.C. 632); and

7 (2) an identification of the assumptions and the
8 source of data underlying the estimate.

9 **SEC. 414. CURRENCY MODERNIZATION.**

10 In the Senate, for purposes of enforcing the Congres-
11 sional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 621 et seq.), any
12 allocation, aggregate, or level under a concurrent resolu-
13 tion on the budget, or any written statement submitted
14 for printing in the Congressional Record by the Chairman
15 of the Committee on the Budget of the Senate that estab-
16 lishes allocations, aggregates, and levels for purposes of
17 enforcing the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, any esti-
18 mate of the changes in budget authority, outlays, and rev-
19 enues of a provision in a bill, joint resolution, motion,
20 amendment, amendment between the Houses, or con-
21 ference report relating to a transition from the \$1 note
22 to a \$1 coin shall—

23 (1) record the changes in budget authority, out-
24 lays, and revenues of the provision in the first year
25 in which the provision takes effect;

1 (2) determine the changes in budget authority,
2 outlays, and revenues of the provision based on a net
3 present value estimate of the changes in budget au-
4 thority, outlays, and revenues of the provision over
5 a 30-year period; and

6 (3) incorporate the changes in budget authority,
7 outlays, and revenues of the provision due to behav-
8 ioral changes.

9 **SEC. 415. CERTAIN ENERGY CONTRACTS.**

10 (a) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term “covered
11 energy savings contract” means—

12 (1) an energy savings performance contract au-
13 thorized under section 801 of the National Energy
14 Conservation Policy Act (42 U.S.C. 8287); and

15 (2) a utility energy service contract, as de-
16 scribed in the Office of Management and Budget
17 Memorandum on Federal use of energy savings per-
18 formance contracting, dated July 25, 1998 (M-98-
19 13), and the Office of Management and Budget
20 Memorandum on the Federal use of energy saving
21 performance contracts and utility energy service con-
22 tracts, dated September 28, 2012 (M-12-21), or any
23 successor to either memorandum.

24 (b) ESTIMATES.—In the Senate, for purposes of en-
25 forcing any point of order established under the Congres-

1 sional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 621 et seq.) or any
2 concurrent resolution on the budget, any estimate by the
3 Congressional Budget Office of the changes in budget au-
4 thority, outlays, and revenues of a provision in a bill, joint
5 resolution, amendment, conference report, or amendment
6 between the Houses modifying the authority to enter, the
7 scope or terms of, or the use of covered energy savings
8 contracts shall—

9 (1) record in the first year in which the author-
10 ity would become effective, the changes in budget
11 authority, outlays, and revenues (as estimated in ac-
12 cordance with paragraph (2)) of any modifications to
13 the authority to enter the covered energy savings
14 contracts;

15 (2) in estimating the changes in budget author-
16 ity, outlays, and revenues of the legislation, calculate
17 the costs and savings arising from covered contracts
18 on a net present value basis by adding market risk
19 over the useful life of the services or product to the
20 discount rate in section 502(5)(E) of the Federal
21 Credit Reform Act of 1990 (2 U.S.C. 661a(5)(E));
22 and

23 (3) classify the effects of the provision to be
24 changes in spending subject to the availability of ap-
25 propriations.

1 (c) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing in sub-
2 section (b) shall be construed to modify the methodology
3 for estimating the changes in budget authority, outlays,
4 and revenues of a provision that does not relate to covered
5 energy savings contracts in a bill, joint resolution, amend-
6 ment, conference report, or amendment between the
7 Houses that contains a provision described in subsection
8 (b).

9 **SEC. 416. LONG-TERM SCORING.**

10 (a) SCORING OF LEGISLATION INCREASING THE DIS-
11 CRETIONARY SPENDING CAPS.—An estimate provided by
12 the Congressional Budget Office under section 402 of the
13 Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 653) for any
14 bill, resolution, amendment between the Houses, or con-
15 ference report that increases the discretionary spending
16 limits under section 251(c) of the Balanced Budget and
17 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(e))
18 shall provide, in addition to the estimate under that sec-
19 tion, an estimate of the changes in budget authority, out-
20 lays, or revenues under the legislation over the period of
21 fiscal year 2016 through fiscal year 2045.

22 (b) SCORING OF LEGISLATION RELATING TO THE
23 HIGHWAY TRUST FUND.—An estimate provided by the
24 Congressional Budget Office under section 402 of the
25 Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 653) for any

1 bill, resolution, amendment between the Houses, or con-
2 ference report that transfers amounts from the General
3 Fund of the Treasury to the Highway Trust Fund shall
4 provide, in addition to the estimate under that section, an
5 estimate of the changes in budget authority, outlays, or
6 revenues under the legislation over the period of fiscal year
7 2016 through fiscal year 2045.

8 **SEC. 417. REQUIRING CLEARER REPORTING OF PRO-**
9 **JECTED FEDERAL SPENDING AND DEFICITS.**

10 When the Congressional Budget Office releases its
11 annual update to the Budget and Economic Outlook, the
12 Congressional Budget Office shall provide a projection of
13 Federal revenues, outlays, and deficits for the 30-year pe-
14 riod beginning with the budget year, expressed in terms
15 of dollars and as a percent of gross domestic product, as
16 part of its annual update required by Public Law 93–344.

17 **SEC. 418. REPORTING ON TAX EXPENDITURES.**

18 The Director of the Congressional Budget Office
19 shall include in the report submitted under section
20 202(e)(1) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 the
21 following:

- 22 (1) An estimate of the cost of tax expenditures
23 as a share of gross domestic product for the budget
24 year and the 9 years following the budget year.

1 (2) Historical data on the cost of tax expendi-
2 tures as a share of gross domestic product for each
3 fiscal year beginning with fiscal year 1965 and end-
4 ing with the budget year.

5 **SEC. 419. CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE ESTIMATES.**

6 (a) REQUEST FOR SUPPLEMENTAL ESTIMATES.—In
7 the case of any legislative provision to which this section
8 applies, the Congressional Budget Office shall prepare, to
9 the extent practicable, an estimate of the outlay changes
10 during the second and third decade of enactment.

11 (b) LEGISLATIVE PROVISIONS TO WHICH THIS SEC-
12 TION APPLIES.—This section shall apply to any spending
13 legislative provision—

14 (1) which proposes a change or changes to law
15 that the Congressional Budget Office determines has
16 an outlay impact in excess of 0.25 percent of the
17 gross domestic product of the United States during
18 the first decade or in the tenth year; or

19 (2) with respect to which the Chairman of the
20 Committee on the Budget of either the Senate or the
21 House of Representatives has requested an estimate
22 described in subsection (a).

1 **SEC. 420. TO REQUIRE TRANSPARENT REPORTING ON THE**
2 **ONGOING COSTS AND SAVINGS TO TAX-**
3 **PAYERS OF OBAMACARE.**

4 When the Congressional Budget Office releases its
5 annual update to the Budget and Economic Outlook, the
6 Congressional Budget Office shall report changes in direct
7 spending and revenue associated with the Patient Protec-
8 tion and Affordable Care Act (Public Law 111–148) and
9 the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010
10 (Public Law 111–152), including the net impact on defi-
11 cits, including both on-budget and off-budget effects, in
12 its annual update required by Public Law 93–344. The
13 information shall be presented in a format similar to that
14 of table 2 of the Congressional Budget Office’s March 20,
15 2010 estimate of the budgetary effects of the Health Care
16 and Educational Reconciliation Act of 2010, in combina-
17 tion with the effects of H.R. 3590, the Patient Protection
18 and Affordable Care Act (PPACA), as passed by the Sen-
19 ate.

20 **SEC. 421. PROHIBITING THE USE OF GUARANTEE FEES AS**
21 **AN OFFSET.**

22 In the Senate, for purposes of determining budgetary
23 impacts to evaluate points of order under the Congres-
24 sional Budget Act of 1974, this resolution, any previous
25 budget resolution, and any subsequent budget resolution,
26 provisions contained in any bill, resolution, amendment,

1 motion, or conference report that increases or extends the
2 increase of, any guarantee fees of the Federal National
3 Mortgage Association and the Federal Home Loan Mort-
4 gage Corporation shall not be scored with respect to the
5 level of budget authority, outlays, or revenues contained
6 in such legislation.

7 **Subtitle B—Other Provisions**

8 **SEC. 431. OVERSIGHT OF GOVERNMENT PERFORMANCE.**

9 In the Senate, all committees are directed to review
10 programs and tax expenditures within their jurisdiction to
11 identify waste, fraud, abuse or duplication, and increase
12 the use of performance data to inform committee work.
13 Committees are also directed to review the matters for
14 congressional consideration identified on the Government
15 Accountability Office's High Risk list and the annual re-
16 port to reduce program duplication. Based on these over-
17 sight efforts and performance reviews of programs within
18 their jurisdiction, committees are directed to include rec-
19 ommendations for improved governmental performance in
20 their annual views and estimates reports required under
21 section 301(d) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974
22 (2 U.S.C. 632(d)) to the Committees on the Budget.

1 **SEC. 432. BUDGETARY TREATMENT OF CERTAIN DISCRE-**
2 **TIONARY ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES.**

3 In the Senate, notwithstanding section 302(a)(1) of
4 the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C.
5 633(a)(1)), section 13301 of the Budget Enforcement Act
6 of 1990 (2 U.S.C. 632 note), and section 2009a of title
7 39, United States Code, the joint explanatory statement
8 accompanying the conference report on any concurrent
9 resolution on the budget shall include in its allocations
10 under section 302(a) of the Congressional Budget Act of
11 1974 to the Committees on Appropriations amounts for
12 the discretionary administrative expenses of the Social Se-
13 curity Administration and of the Postal Service.

14 **SEC. 433. APPLICATION AND EFFECT OF CHANGES IN ALLO-**
15 **CATIONS AND AGGREGATES.**

16 (a) APPLICATION.—Any adjustments of allocations
17 and aggregates made pursuant to this resolution shall—

18 (1) apply while that measure is under consider-
19 ation;

20 (2) take effect upon the enactment of that
21 measure; and

22 (3) be published in the Congressional Record as
23 soon as practicable.

24 (b) EFFECT OF CHANGED ALLOCATIONS AND AG-
25 GREGATES.—Revised allocations and aggregates resulting
26 from these adjustments shall be considered for the pur-

1 poses of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C.
2 621 et seq.) as allocations and aggregates contained in
3 this resolution.

4 (c) BUDGET COMMITTEE DETERMINATIONS.—For
5 purposes of this resolution the levels of new budget au-
6 thority, outlays, direct spending, new entitlement author-
7 ity, revenues, deficits, and surpluses for a fiscal year or
8 period of fiscal years shall be determined on the basis of
9 estimates made by the Committee on the Budget of the
10 Senate.

11 **SEC. 434. ADJUSTMENTS TO REFLECT CHANGES IN CON-**
12 **CEPTS AND DEFINITIONS.**

13 Upon the enactment of a bill or joint resolution pro-
14 viding for a change in concepts or definitions, the Chair-
15 man of the Committee on the Budget of the Senate may
16 make adjustments to the levels and allocations in this res-
17 olution in accordance with section 251(b) of the Balanced
18 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2
19 U.S.C. 901(b)).

20 **SEC. 435. EXERCISE OF RULEMAKING POWERS.**

21 Congress adopts the provisions of this title—

22 (1) as an exercise of the rulemaking power of
23 the Senate, and as such they shall be considered as
24 part of the rules of the Senate and such rules shall

1 supersede other rules only to the extent that they
2 are inconsistent with such other rules; and
3 (2) with full recognition of the constitutional
4 right of the Senate to change those rules at any
5 time, in the same manner, and to the same extent
6 as is the case of any other rule of the Senate.
